Philmont 2014

Two crews comprised of members and leaders from Troops 451 and 21 of Turlock participated in Philmont treks from June 17th—28th. During their trek



one crew, 617E2, hiked 120 miles and the other crew, 617E1, hiked 70 miles over 10 days.

The group of Scouts and their leaders carried everything they needed to survive during their trek on their backs while hiking from camp to camp. They participated in backcountry programs along the way including mountain biking, gold prospecting, black powder rifle shooting, search and rescue (one crew "rescued" Doug having a "fractured" leg). They climbed Baldy Mountain (12,441 elevation), and participated in challenge events designed for group interaction . The treks included a 3 hour conservation project where the Scouts and leaders worked on the mountain bike trail near Whiteman Vega camp in the Valle Videl. Along the trail, Scouts endured tough challenges including backpacking in bear and mountain lion territory, steep climbs across country hiking (no trails) and weather changes. 617E1 was in awe when they came to a clearing and saw 150+ Elk running across the meadow!

617E2 went out one evening to watch the deer and saw and watched the behavior of a momma bear and her cubs wandering along the meadow's edge.

Any Scout Troop or Crew can participate in a Philmont trek, but you need to plan nearly 2 years in advance. For instance, if you want to do a trek in the summer of 2016 you would need to apply to Philmont in October of 2014. The experience is well-worth the time, effort and planning!

INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

The International Scouting Program was establish a few short years following the worldwide rapid growth of the scouting movement following the establishment of the Scouting Movement Program by Lord Robert Baden Powell in 1907.

The World Organizations of the Scout Movement is a federation of more than 150+ recognized world national scout organizations in the International Scouting Program.

The International Division of the Boy Scouts of America is the overseer of the B.S.A. International Scouting Program and the B.S.A. is a member of the world Scout Conference and the

World Scout Committee is the executive body and the B.S.A. has a delegate on the committee.

Each B.S.A. Council has the responsibility to establish an International Committee to work with International Office to promote International Scouting.

The "Yosemite Area Council," now the "Greater Yosemite Council" established the International Committee and asked if I would be the Council International representative in 1992.

The committee meets quarterly to provide International Activities for the council and promote several other functions as established by the International Division.

The Council International Rep. establishes a council committee and with organizational structure the committee works to provide and inform and promote through the council to the districts the various international activities, programs and events.

These events include -- World Jamboree events, Jamboree on the Air (JOTA), International Camp Staff Program, European Camp Staff Program, World brotherhood Exchange, and other types of International Events . The International Committee provides World Support for the listed programs, World Friendship Fund, United States Foundation for International Scouting, Baden Powell World Fellowship, and Order of the Condor.

The International Scouters Award can be earned by Council International Committee Members.
